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GDPR: WHAT INFORMATION MUST YOU PROVIDE TO YOUR CONTACTS/PATIENTS?

- 1. The name and contact details of your organisation
- 2. The name and contact details of your representative
- 3. The contact details of your data protection officer (not relevant)
- 4. The purposes of the processing
- 5. The lawful basis for the processing:
 - eg medical records retention
- 6. The legitimate interests for the processing

you have asked for information on a specific subject (through an advert, or by ticking a consent box on a website or clinic sign-up form)

information may be relevant to your medical condition (I'm trying to help)

7. The categories of personal data obtained (not necessary if provided by the person concerned)

- Name and address
- Date of Birth
- Email address
- Telephone number(s)
- Medical history

- Medical information provided by third parties (MRI reports/scans, consultant reports)

- 8. The recipients or categories of recipients of the personal data:
 - generally none, without the patient's permission

9. The details of transfers of the personal data to any third countries or international organisations (not relevant to osteo and chiro clinics)

10. The retention periods for the personal data (8 years or up to age 25 if longer for medical records)

11. The rights available to individuals in respect of the processing:

to be informed of what is kept (unless they provide it in person – in which case they know!)

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– to access data (free of charge, and within a reasonable, very short, timescale)

- to rectify errors

- to be forgotten (but not erasure of medical records, and you can always keep sufficient data to ensure that you know the contact has asked to be forgotten)

- to restrict processing (usually only if there's a legal dispute)

- to data "portability" (ie have it sent to an alternative practitioner)

 to withdraw consent (this opportunity must be clearly available and simple to take up)

 to object (particularly to marketing information, but also for scientific/statistical processing)

- to lodge a complaint with a supervisory authority

12. The source of the personal data (not necessary if it's the person themself)

13. The details of whether individuals are under a statutory or contractual obligation to provide the personal data (not relevant)

14.The details of the existence of automated decision-making, including profiling (not relevant)
