## **Case-Based Discussion**



## **Summary**

This case concerned a 47-year-old female primary school teacher. She had a 5-year history of unilateral forearm/elbow pain, which had gradually spread to her shoulder and neck. MRI, nerve conduction and CT were reported as unremarkable. She also reported pain across the dorsal wrist, but there were no carpal restrictions or indications of OA.

Many suggestions were offered, including evaluation of pelvic and spinal alignment, treatment of specific trigger points (especially subscapularis). It was also thought that accessing the MR imagery might be helpful, as radiologists sometimes overlook aspects of interest to MSK practitioners. Examination of, and treatment to the elbow was suggested, and the potential for stress to be a component was raised. Thoracic Outlet Syndrome was also suggested.
